Practicing medicine is hard work these days. Practicing rural medicine is even harder. Practicing rural medicine in Indiana where resources for "excellent" care are often limited is almost impossible. Dr. Walters has set those hurdles aside in her pursuit of always providing excellent care for her patients in the small rural community of Wyatt, Indiana.

Dr. Walters could have had her pick of jobs, given her education and training, but commitment to community and a strong desire to find work that would allow her to balance family and medicine, led her to consider a rural practice. She had already seen in medical school how even one more family doc can revitalize a community and open the doors of access to health care for its citizens. Spending time in Paoli, Indiana, as a student opened her eyes to how family physicians can be fully integrated into a community.

As the only female family physician in the broader Wyatt community, her presence created not just simple office visit supply, but patient access to a sometimes different philosophy of care and a different type of "listening" than male physicians sometimes can do. By providing obstetrics care, the Community Hospital of Bremen was able to work

on its obstetrical out-migration problem. By also adding a family physician that provided surgical obstetrics care, Dr. Walters' presence rounded out a team that was suddenly able to provide premier childbirth services where several years earlier there were no services at all.

Dr. Walters' patients are able to observe how a young mother balances her professional and personal responsibilities while leveraging technology and the rest of her team to still take great care of them. As a role model of "professional maternity" she brings a new level of mentoring to the mothers whose babies she has recently delivered.

A generation ago, a true country doc was a white-haired, male physician, trained by the medical establishment to place his commitment to medicine and community above all

else in the pursuit of success. Dr. Walters is the epitome of the new country physician—thorough, compassionate, and committed as ever, but now able to see that the road to true success in rural medicine must also include teamwork, technology, collaboration with non-physician providers, and a commitment to family that rivals one's commitment to the practice. Patients see and appreciate that—a physician who is "one of us."

Bowen Center Now Offering Outpatient Therapy Services at Community Hospital of Bremen

In 2012, the Community Hospital of Bremen (CHB) conducted a Community Health Needs Assessment for Bremen and the surrounding areas. One of the main needs identified from the assessment was the lack of mental health services in Bremen. In response to that need, Community Hospital of Bremen is proud to announce that the Bowen Center is now offering outpatient mental health services in CHB's Medical Office Suites. Appointments are available on Mondays, Thursdays and Fridays by calling (574) 936-9646.

Bringing the Bowen Center back to Bremen will allow patients to receive services locally, rather than having to drive to Plymouth to be seen. The Community Hospital of Bremen is continuously working to meet the needs of the community and bring services closer to home whenever feasible.

Introducing- Hugs® Infant Protection System

The Hugs® Infant Protection System is a truly "secure" infant/child security system that has minimal or no false alarms, with a unique, continuously active monitoring system. Designed specifically



for protection of patients in the maternity units, the key element of the patient security system is the tamper-proof infant tags. The infant tag is an active technology ankle tag that transmits its own unique digital signal every 10 seconds to a series of ceiling mounted receivers connected to a central computer. If this signal is lost for any reason, the tag is detected in exit areas, or if the tag strap is tampered with or cut, the system not only sounds an alarm but also instantly identifies which signal has been lost with the baby's name. In addition, the system can also control door locks, auxiliary devices, cameras and alarms.

The Hugs® system will be installed at the Community Hospital of Bremen in October 2014.

Improving Communication

In an effort to improve communication among providers, patients and families, the Community Hospital of Bremen has installed specially designed white boards in every patient room on the Medical Surgical Unit. The hospital recognizes that communication plays a key role in patients having a positive experience and facilitating the best patient outcomes. This open communication will aid in decreasing patient anxiety and assist patients to feel more confident about the care they are receiving.

The white boards are situated in the rooms so that patients can see them from their bed. Each board clearly states the patient's plan of care for the day and any tests scheduled, along with the name of nurse who is caring for them, their current diet and any other special care needs. Pain management is another vital component of the boards. This section details the patient's pain goal, a numeric chart for the patient to assess their pain level and when the last dose of pain medication was administered.

In addition to promoting effective communication between hospital staff and their patients, these boards improve communication among all members of the healthcare team providing care for the patient. This way, the entire team is on the same page, and everyone is working together to provide the high quality of care patients expect to receive at the Community Hospital of Bremen.

Community Hospital of Bremen Offers Prepay OB Program

The Community Hospital of Bremen recognizes the need to reduce patient expense for hospital maternity care. Therefore, the hospital has established a Pre-Pay OB Package Plan (Cash Package). These packages are discounted and have been created for those individuals without maternity coverage. Full payment is expected 30 days prior to the anticipated date of delivery.

This package is available to expectant mothers who agree to prepay a stipulated amount for themselves and their

well baby. These prepay package plans do NOT include the professional fees of the mother's physician, the baby's physician, or the CRNA/anesthesiologist. If required these fees will be billed separately by the providers. Other exclusions to the package may apply and will be billed separately.

Establishing the following mission and vision statements were the first tasks of PFAC.

Mission: The Community Hospital of Bremen's Patient and Family Advisory Council (PFAC), is developed to provide a forum through which patients and families can share feedback, suggestions and ideas to continuously improve quality and patient care experiences.

Vision Statement: Community Hospital of Bremen is committed to a partnership with patients, families and community members to enhance the services provided by the hospital to the community we serve. Patients and family members will provide ongoing input regarding patients' needs and their experience as patients of Community Hospital of Bremen. Input from PFAC members will be integrated in ongoing process improvement efforts.

Patient and family engagement through such advisory councils is associated with fewer adverse events, better patient self-management, fewer diagnostic tests, decreased use of health-care services, shorter lengths of stay in the hospital, lower health-care costs and higher ratings of patient satisfaction.
